What the 2017 Legislative Session Contributes to History-Social Science

With over a dozen bills potentially impacting the History-Social Science (HSS) classroom, it has been a roller coaster ride this Legislative session!

As of September 16, 2017, the final day that legislation was passed for this session, we see the first HSS-related bill submitted made the final cut, as did four others with a Concurrent Resolution added right at the last minute.

The excitement is not quite over. We still need to wait and see if Governor Brown signs the bills into law.

[Assembly Bill \(AB\) 24](#), focusing on civic engagement, was sent to the Governor's desk on September 9, 2017. The requirements of this bill would award students who fulfill a yet to be determined criteria with a State Seal of Civic Engagement (SSCE).

[AB 189](#), a model curriculum for service learning, would complement the SSCE by providing a curriculum that schools could use to provide a service learning experience for students.

[Senate Bill \(SB\) 596](#) titled Student Empowerment Commission, did not start out that way. In February, Senator Stern introduced a bill on youth participation and civic engagement. The bill was amended in the Senate at the end of March to change the bill to outline the process by which a student representative would be elected to the State Board of Education (SBE).

Finally, in July, when the bill passed to the Assembly, it was again amended to the current title and content.

[AB 858](#) will establish the California Financial Literacy Initiative as a program to improve financial literacy. The program will offer online instructional materials for teachers and parents to provide high-quality financial literacy education for students K-12.

[AB 738](#) requires the development of a model curriculum in Native American studies. The bill also encourages all public and charter schools that teach grades 9-12 to offer a course of study in Native American studies based on the model curriculum.

[Assembly Concurrent Resolution 129](#), which emphasizes civic engagement, would recognize the importance of civic engagement across all of the State of California, and does refer to AB 24 and SB 596.

Not only did the Legislature give us some education bills, but they also budgeted funds for HSS curriculum and professional development.

As mentioned in last month's newsletter, the California Historical Society (CHS) and The California HSS Project (CHSSP) at UC Davis will collaborate to establish and implement Teaching California: an innovative, free, online resource bank of instructional materials to support the new HSS Framework. They will have a \$5 Million State grant to accomplish this.

Angel Island State Park

2017 Legislative Session, continued.

Funds for Teaching California will be appropriated in the 2017–18 fiscal year to create this free online open resource bank for K–12 for HSS. Resources will be made available to teachers by July 1, 2019.

AB 97, The Budget Act of 2017, allocated \$10 Million to support professional development (PD) and resources for the HSS Framework and the upcoming Health Education Framework. Five million will go to each discipline. The funds are to be spent starting this fiscal year (July 1, 2017–June 30, 2018) through the 2019–20 fiscal year.

The HSS funds are to be used to provide PD and regional training for teachers, administrators, and paraprofessionals, including but not limited to, the Armenian Genocide, labor, LGBT, and civic education components for the HSS framework.

Additionally, the AB 97 funding will be used to provide access to an online repository of resources to support implementation of the Frameworks. There will be more information forthcoming on the timeline and activities occurring with this funding.

So, needless to say, there will be a lot going on and provided for HSS educators in the near future. You can be sure to find updates in future newsletters.

And, please stay tuned for more information regarding requests for your involvement in the new legislative initiatives.

2017 HSS Instructional Materials Adoption (K–8)

On September 28, 2017, the Instructional Quality Commission (IQC) met to review the Advisory Reports written when publisher submitted materials were reviewed during deliberations. These deliberations were held July 25-28, 2017 in Sacramento. This past week, the IQC reviewed the advisory reports. You should be able to read the minutes of the IQC meeting [here](#) to find out what the IQC recommended to the SBE.

And, stay tuned, because the SBE will review the IQC and Advisory Reports and make their final recommendations for the list of state adopted K–8 texts. The SBE will meet on November 8–9, 2017, and on the agenda will be the HSS instructional materials adoption. You can find the agenda for that meeting, when it becomes available, [here](#).

State Guidelines to Improve Services for Students with Dyslexia

In 2015, the Legislature passed Assembly Bill 1369, which required the CDE to consult with a stakeholder group of teachers, school administrators, education professionals, medical professionals, parents, and others involved in educating students with dyslexia. The bill also required the CDE to post the new guidelines on the Department's Web site for the 2017–18 school year.

The CDE's goal of the California Dyslexia Guidelines is to provide practical information and resources for identifying and supporting students who may have dyslexia.

The expert group met for more than a year to assist the CDE in the development of the guidelines, which are now available with other information on this [CDE Web page](#).

World of 7 Billion Video Contest

Back by popular demand, the *World of 7 Billion* student video contest helps bring technology and creativity into your middle and high school classes.
